Braided Narratives

November marked an important month for NERWHA with the commencement of the first symposium, *Braided Narratives: Integrating Research and Teaching*. The event held at Salem State University on November 5 brought together two excellent roundtable discussions on the ways research informs teaching world history.



The morning roundtable session, "Tools and Techniques in World History Research and Teaching," addressed the general problem of bringing World History into the classroom. We heard stimulating presentations from:
