## Spring 2015 Symposium

On March 28, 2015, Northeastern University and the New England Regional World History Association will hold a oneday symposium to honor Pat Manning's contributions to the field of World History. Northeastern University is an ideal location for this symposium, since Pat founded both the World History Ph.D. program and the World History Center there in 1994. Pat moved to the University of Pittsburgh in 2006, where he is now the Andrew W. Mellon Professor of World History.

The symposium will run from 8:45 to 5:30, and will feature Pat Manning as the keynote speaker. The rest of the symposium will feature Pat's former graduate students, secondary teachers he trained, and area scholars involved in research and scholarship in the field of world history.
